We compiled feedback from over 200 individuals – current and former trekkers, staff, board members, school partners, and others. We are proud of what we have accomplished thus far, and we thank everyone who had a role in making this plan become a reality.

Our 2023 Accomplishments

STRATEGIC DIRECTION #1: OUR PROGRAMS, IMMERSIVE LEARNING FOR A CHANGING WORLD

- Summer Trekkers served: 139.
- Created a series of school program offerings including Every Kid Outdoors, Community Camping, Plan Your Own Adventure, a revamped Students in Wilderness Initiative (SIWI), and more.
- Launched two new summer treks: Quartz Trek and Blue Corn Trek.
- Increased staff wages 7-15%.
- Began partnering with Sunny505, a local, woman-owned. marketing firm, to better share the impact of our programs.

STRATEGIC DIRECTION #2: STRENGTHEN AND DIVERSIFY THE GULCH COMMUNITY

- Completed the first Quartz Trek for non-binary youth.
- Reached over 1,700 youth in our school programs.
- Awarded over \$110,000 in scholarships to summer trekkers.
- Hired our first ever Development Director.
- Convened a Cultural Advisory Group; current discussions include cultural awareness around naming conventions and renovation guidelines for Basecamp.
- Conducted our third annual volunteer work weekend with 40+ participants.

STRATEGIC DIRECTION #3: MODEL ENVIRONMENTAL STEWARDSHIP

- Secured \$150k in funding from the State of New Mexico for vehicles; plan to purchase organization's first electric vehicle.
- Completed a prescribed burn on 120 acres at Basecamp to improve forest health and reduce wildfire risk
- Incorporated environmental stewardship into our program design and initiated staff stewardship projects at Basecamp.
- Created the Environmental Restoration school trek for high school students.

STRATEGIC DIRECTION #4: INVEST IN OPERATIONS AND INFRASTRUCTURE

- Revamped our internal staff structure to create more transparency and professional development opportunities for our year-round staff.
- Created a "Gulch Way Drive" to house our agreed-upon internal processes, templates, checklists, and resources.
- Updated our staff manual.
- Added \$150k to our cash reserve fund; Implemented a new financial tracking system, "Divvy," which allows us to better budget and track direct program expenses.
- Selected a new database system to allow more comprehensive alumni, trekker and constituent tracking, improve our reporting capabilities, and increase efficiency of work. Implementation of the new system will begin in January 2024.
- Basecamp improvements included: replacement of the Hogan roof, increased OSHA compliance for worker safety, replacement of caretaker's well pump, removal of defunct latrines; foliage thinning, gravel firebreak, and dead tree removal around core buildings, rebuilding the bouldering wall, and construction of benches and tables.

Empowering our Communi

The creation and growth of school year programming at the Gulch over the past 17 years has resulted in a new era of treks that have reached thousands of students. School programs target students in our home state of New Mexico who were woefully underrepresented at the Gulch in prior decades. A greater diversity of trekkers has benefited all of our groups, and has increased public awareness about CGE. More than ever, we are witnessing the value of providing opportunities for youth to get outdoors; the social emotional learning benefits, the calmness that kids identify when having a chance to be "unplugged," and the connections that occur when youth are introduced to green areas in their own neighborhoods. We are inspired by these experiences and are dedicated to continuing school partnerships and further empowering our community.

Cultivating Accessibility

SABA PRESLEY: MOUNTAIN MAHOGANY COMMUNITY SCHOOL SCIENCE TEACHER

Interviewed by TANNER JOHNSON

Tanner: How did you find out about Cottonwood Gulch?

Saba: I found out about CGE through my school, Mountain Mahogany. It was my first year there, in 2016, and I was a 4th grade teacher. The middle school was really excited because the 8th graders were getting ready to go out on their capstone 3 day trek.

T: What are some of your favorite memories with CGE?

S: My favorite memories revolve around interactions that I have with students outdoors. Its just a whole different world being out in nature with students vs having them in the classroom. Being outside with them is so different, and you get to see strengths that you wouldn't witness in the classroom.

T: How did your time at CGE impact your life today?

S:Well, I feel like I have to mention that we are currently at Basecamp, with 60 kids, so definitely impacting me today. I was just mentioning to a coworker how this is my favorite way to spend a day. I feel a profound sense of pride knowing that I am able to help usher in this experience for kids. A lot of these kids have gone out and done this before, but a lot have never even been camping before. So just **being able to increase access, and give these opportunities and experiences to kiddos is really... I don't know if its changed my life, but its definitely something that I am proud of, and I wouldn't be able to do it without the Gulch.**

Clara: What are some of your favorite memories with the Gulch?

Ophelia: One day on Outfit I was feeling stressed, missing home, having a bad day, and needed some time on my own. I took a walk to the Cha'oh during golden hour, laid down and it started raining. I loved taking alone time with a beautiful sky in the Southwest and rain on the metal roof. It felt really special, happy and peaceful.

C: How has your time with the Gulch impacted your life today and back at home?

O: It's changed everything a lot. **Cottonwood Gulch is a** place where I feel happy, somewhere I feel brave, and where I feel I belong and can connect with the nature and people around me. When I think about my time with the Gulch and what it has taught me: being with



people, spending time in Wilderness, skills I've built, time with myself and the group and in nature, **it feels grounding** and that it's what it's like to actually live.

C: What keeps you coming back to the Gulch again and again?

O:There's something about Basecamp that feels super special. **It brings me home** and it is really incredible. On the road, we built our little routine and got to connect so well as a group and it made me realize how much I can interact with people and connect with them, especially doing things in nature that aren't easy. Some of the friends I have made at the Gulch I am still in contact with and connected with, it's nice to be able to have a way to build community and friends.

Coming Back to Our Roots: Summer at the Gulch

Innovative Tradition

Our 97th summer was a shining success thanks to our dedicated seasonal staff team and our expansive community partners. From stunning sunrises over Muley Point to camping at a ghost town in Hermosa, NM, each trek experienced an amazing array of adventure, science and cultural experiences. Our pilot year of Blue Corn Trek brought aspiring foodies and farmers together to learn about and taste food systems in the Southwest. We also added Quartz Trek which invited non-binary and genderqueer youth to have the same life-changing shared experience as our boys' trek and girls' trek. All of our trekkers spent the summer living in community, laughing, learning and singing many a "Ghost Riders" around the campfire.

The Silver Buckle Award

Why Do We Keep Coming Back? The People.

And we always want to honor the people who have given years of service to Cottonwood Gulch.

This year, the Cottonwood Gulch staff and Development Committee created a new award, based on a very old award: the Silver Buckle. The Silver Buckle Award is a time-honored tradition at Cottonwood Gulch Expeditions, historically presented to trekkers who distinguished themselves in some way over the course of the summer. The original Silver Buckle continues to be awarded to trekkers whenever summer program staff feel it is warranted.

In 2023, Cottonwood Gulch Expeditions created an additional version of this award, designed to recognize excellence in volunteers, staff, and/or donors who have demonstrated an impactful pattern of service to the Gulch. The award honors years of contribution and sustained support of the Gulch.

We initiated a formal nomination process, open to the public, and we received numerous inspiring nominations. From that list, the Development Committee chose 4 awardees from among those nominated. The awardees were ratified by the Cottonwood Gulch Board of Directors and each presented with a custom-made silver buckle, crafted by a Native New Mexican silversmith at the annual Board meeting in October, 2023.

Tom Hyde:



Development Updates

It's been an eventful year for development activities at Cottonwood Gulch. We created a new position: Development Director and hired Carrie Dalrymple to fill it. We received funding from the US Forest Service to start our Every Kid Outdoors program; and selected a new database system to record and track our donors and grants. Below are some development highlights from 2023.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Institution of an additional Silver Buckle Award to recognize excellence in volunteers, staff and/or donors who have demonstrated an impactful pattern of service to the Gulch.
- Over \$366,000 in donations from 315 individual donors.
- Spent \$343,956 of grant funds awarded by 7 different funding partners to support our school year programming, Summer Youth Conservation Corp, and programming at Bachechi Open Space.
- Nearly \$56,000 raised for scholarships for summer trekkers.



Our Endowment

At our 75th anniversary in 2001, an idea was proposed by then Board Chair Jamey French to create an endowment for Cottonwood Gulch.Today that endowment holds \$1.1 million dollars.

We manage the endowment funds so that we preserve the amount that was contributed, invest the money so that it earns interest, and spend part of the interest every year.
