

EVERY KID OUTDOORS





Every Kid Outdoors introduces fourth grade students to public lands in their local community. In partnership with the U.S. Forest Service the goal of Every Kid Outdoors is to increase students' appreciation of public lands by connecting them with their natural and cultural resources. Focusing on experiential and place-based learning, students will be exposed to a variety of landscapes and ecosystems which will help instill a sense of place and stewardship for public lands. Students will also learn about possibilities of federal land management careers through Forest Service guest speakers. Providing both classroom and in the field lessons, experiences include a pre trip lesson, day trip to local public lands, post trip lesson.

OUTCOMES

- Students will be able understand the importance of stewardship pertaining to public lands.
- Students will feel connected and a sense of belonging to their home environment.
- Students will recognize how moving their bodies can be fun, challenging and used to experience the outdoors.
- Students will learn about natural and cultural resources of the public lands they visit.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

A possible week at a glance depending on classes in participating schools:

- Monday- Pre trip lesson
- Tuesday-Thursday- Day trips to local public
- lands Friday-Post trip lesson

Every student participating in the program will receive a free annual interagency pass.

Students will collaborate and learn from federal land management agency employees, including learning about place-based education and potential future career pathways.

Students will be exposed to exercise and body movement through team building games, hiking and walking outdoors.

5 total days of programming including classroom and field days
